“He who is slow to anger has great understanding, but he who has a hasty temper exalts folly.”

-Proverbs 14:29

In our fallen world, anger rises quickly. The old Adam within us flares at the slightest offense—whether a careless word, a delayed plan, or an unmet expectation. Scripture reminds us that this hasty spirit is no small matter! It is folly exalted, a fruit of original sin that reveals our self-centered hearts. We are by nature quick to judge, quick to defend our pride, and slow to show mercy. Scripture diagnoses us honestly: apart from Christ, we are slaves to passion, ruled by the flesh rather than led by the Spirit.

Yet the Holy Spirit calls us to something better through the wisdom of Proverbs. The one “slow to anger” demonstrates true understanding—not mere emotional control, but the fear of the Lord that begins all wisdom. This patience reflects the character of our God, who is “merciful and gracious, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love” (Psalm 103:8). In the cross of Jesus Christ, we see this patience perfectly displayed. Though we daily provoke God with our sins, He does not deal with us according to our iniquities. Instead, the Father poured out His wrath on His beloved Son so that we might receive forgiveness freely by grace through faith.

Dear Christian, when anger stirs within you today, remember your baptism. You are not defined by your temper but by the righteousness of Christ imputed to you. The same Gospel that justifies you also sanctifies you. The Holy Spirit works patience in your heart as you abide in God’s Word, receive the Sacrament, and live in repentance and faith. In your home, workplace, and congregation, practice this slow-to-anger love. Listen first. Forgive quickly. Speak gently. In doing so, you exalt not folly, but the wisdom of the cross.

Lord Jesus, grant us the great understanding that comes from You. Curb our hasty tempers by Your Word and Spirit. Teach us to walk in patience as You have been patient with us. Forgive our anger, and make us instruments of Your peace. Amen.

“Abide, O faithful Savior, Among us with Your love; grant steadfastness and help us to reach our home above.”

- LSB 919:6

This July is rather monumental for our nation as we together celebrate the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and the birthday of this nation in which we live. The Declaration famously says: *“We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.”* Great Britain had become a tyrant over the States and the Declaration goes on to list those tyrannical actions. The founding fathers then declared: *“appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States.”*

But as we celebrate the freedom of our nation against tyranny, we would do well to remember the words of the true Supreme Judge of the world, Jesus, who says: *“Apart from Me you can do nothing”* (John 15:5). Indeed, let us recall and repeat the words of the disciples on the Emmaus road, imploring the Lord, *“abide with us, for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent”* (Luke 24:29). We are on the eve of this world, and alone we are helpless against the assaults of Satan, the temptations of sin, and the idolatry of this world; all of which are wretched tyrants. Therefore, if we wish to reach our home above, we may only do so by the grace of God.

The hymn, *Abide, O Dearest Jesus*, written in 1627 by Lutheran pastor and professor Josua Stegmann, had appended a note: *“a prayer for the preservation of doctrine and of the Church of God.”* Indeed, just such a thing is necessary for us as we celebrate our nation’s independence. Let us never grow proud of our own accomplishments, or think that our nation’s existence comes about as the result of our own labors. Rather, it is only by the mercies of our Lord Jesus Christ, who abides among us with His grace, word, light, protection, and love, that we are free.

May the Lord bless our nation with grace and wisdom that we may daily grow in His Word.

Go ... Sell All You Have?

“What must I do to inherit eternal life?” asked the rich young ruler. Jesus said, “You know the commandments.” And he replied, “All these I have kept from my youth.” And Jesus said to him, “One thing you still lack. Sell all that you have and distribute to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow me” (Luke 18:18–22).

When we hear this story, this question comes to mind: is Jesus speaking to us also, or only to the rich young ruler? In other words, is Jesus telling us to sell all that we have and give it to the poor?

As good Lutherans, we answer, “No!” But why? Why should we not sell all that we have and distribute it to the poor? The simplest explanation is this: if we sold everything we have, our wife and our children would be neglected. In other words, to sell everything we have and give it to the poor would ignore, even abandon, those whom God has placed in our care. Our money, everything we have, is not to be used solely for the church. But that doesn’t excuse us from using our money for the purpose God intends.

Everyone has three stations in life, three spheres in which we live and are to be of service to our neighbors. These stations are the church, the family and society. We are members of all three of these by birth. We are born into the church by water and the Word of God, and our duties to others in the church arise from our Baptism into the church. We are born into a family, and our duties to others stem from our birth into that family. Finally, we are born into society, which is simply a further extension of our birth into our family. The duties we have toward other members of society come from either our own birth or the birth of others into the same society.

All that we have and all that we are ought to be pressed into service for the church, the family and society. If we were to

sell all we have and give only to one, the other two would be neglected, and we would falter in fulfilling our duties.

So, consider your life and all that you have in light of these three stations. You pay taxes to support and help those in society. You save for college for your children, and provide food, clothing and shelter for the members of your family.

But the station that is usually thought of last is the church. Since the needs of the family and society are more immediate, the church is often given what is left over. This is not how it should be. Rather, we are to give of our first fruits, from off the top, the best, even as Abel gave the best of his flock.

This requires forethought. It means that you sit down and make a plan of what you will give from the beginning. It means sticking to it even when it seems that there are other more immediate and pressing things.

And this is all the more necessary now as we enter into periods of time where giving is low due to high unemployment or where restrictions on meeting in church limit opportunities to give. If we love God and His gifts of forgiveness given through the Means of Grace, which we receive at church and only at church, then we will support it, just as we love our country and our family. For all that we have and all that we are is given to us by our gracious God. He spared no expense for us and our salvation. He gave up His Son to death so that our sins are forgiven, and we will live. What's more, He provides for all that we need for this body and life. And our lives in this world, among these three spheres of church, family and society are to mirror the generosity of the one who gave us life in all three at birth.

Don't let the church, your divine family, be an afterthought or even ignored. It is nurturing you, bringing you up in salvation through Word and Sacrament.
